About The San Francisco Survey

- The San Francisco Survey is a project of the Committee on Jobs conducted by EMC Research and Fall Line Analytics. Our goals are to develop an on-going tool to gauge public opinion and to help inform elected officials and interested parties of the public's views on policy issues. The San Francisco Survey uses an open and transparent platform and will release the results of each of the surveys it conducts.
- In addition to providing survey results, the San Francisco Survey will release demographic and voter data on a regular basis to help inform policy discussions in San Francisco.



Methodology

- Web Survey of San Francisco Voters
- Conducted in English, Spanish, and Chinese
- Demographics closely match the demographics of the registered voters in the city

Key findings


- Voter optimism seems to have leveled off, with nearly equal proportions of voters saying the city is going in the right and wrong directions.
- Most voters continue to be excited about the city's future.
- Nevertheless, a very strong majority continues to agree that the city is a good place to live.
- Cost of living continues to dominate all other concerns for voters, and has overtaken education as their highest policy priority.



GENERAL ATTITUDES ABOUT SF

Right Direction/Wrong Track

Voter optimism has leveled off with equal numbers feeling optimistic and pessimistic.





Excited about Future/Worried about Changes


Although worry about where the city is going has reached one third, the vast majority of voters are excited about the future of the city..






Economic Conditions


Economic confidence is down slightly but the vast majority believe the economy will be the same or better in the coming months.

Q4. Would you rate current economic conditions in San Francisco as substantially better, moderately better, the same, moderately worse, or substantially worse than six months ago?






San Francisco Attitudes






San Francisco Attitudes

Top Three Problems In San Francisco


Cost of living and housing are still dominant concerns for voters.

Although they are still frequently mentioned as important problems, homelessness, transportation, and the economy are declining as SF's most important problems.








When asked about top problems specifically for <u>you and your family</u>, little has changed in the past year – voters continue to rank cost of living and housing as top concerns.

Most Important Problem For You and Your Family






Q7. What would you say are the most important problems facing you and your family today? (top ranked response)



Priorities

Over three-quarters (77%) now say controlling the cost of living should be important in San Francisco; supporting quality public schools is also a top priority for voters.




Q17-26. On a scale from 1 to 7, where 1 is not at all important and 7 is extremely important, how important do you feel each of the following should be in San Francisco right now?

Controlling the cost of living has now overtaken all other issues as voters' top priority.




Q17-26. On a scale from 1 to 7, where 1 is not at all important and 7 is extremely important, how important do you feel each of the following should be in San Francisco right now?
