About The San Francisco Survey

- The San Francisco Survey is a project of the Committee on Jobs conducted by EMC Research and Fall Line Analytics. Our goals are to develop an on-going tool to gauge public opinion and to help inform elected officials and interested parties of the public's views on policy issues. The San Francisco Survey uses an open and transparent platform and will release the results of each of the surveys it conducts.
- In addition to providing survey results, the San Francisco Survey will release demographic and voter data on a regular basis to help inform policy discussions in San Francisco.



Methodology

- Web Survey of San Francisco Voters
- Offered in English, Spanish, and Chinese
- Demographics closely match the demographics of the registered voters in the city


SAN FRANCISCO SURVEY

Key Findings

- Voter pessimism appears to be on the rise
- Cost of living and housing remain dominant concerns citywide
- General attitudes about growth in SF are positive, but half say the City is growing too fast.
- Most voters do not think economic growth benefits people at all income levels and many say they do not benefit personally.



Right Direction/Wrong Track




Q3. Do you think things in San Francisco are generally going in the right direction, or do you feel that things are pretty seriously off on the wrong track?



San Francisco Attitudes

Strong concern about changes in the City is growing slightly over time; there is now a 21 point gap in intensity of satisfaction versus dissatisfaction.

I am unhappy or worried about changes happening in San Francisco




Do you agree or disagree with each of the following statements? 15. I am unhappy or worried about changes happening in San Francisco

Although voter anxiety is high, nearly two-thirds (63%) also say they are excited for the future of SF.




Do you agree or disagree with each of the following statements? 15. I am unhappy or worried about changes happening in SF 16. I am excited about the future of SF

San Francisco is a good place to live




Do you agree or disagree with each of the following statements? **17. San Francisco is a good place to live**

There has also been a slight but continual shift in the number of voters who say they are likely to move out of the city.




Do you agree or disagree with each of the following statements? 19. I am likely to move out of San Francisco in the next few years

Cost of living, housing, and homelessness remain top concerns in San Francisco.



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
Most Important Problem in San Francisco

Mentions of the cost of living as a top problem within voters' neighborhoods have spiked since February. There are also more mentions of cleanliness and streets and roads.




Note: In February, respondents answered to an open-ended question, while in May they selected their answers from a list that excluded "Parking" as an option.

Most Important Problem in Your Neighborhood





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

52% of voters say San Francisco is growing too fast.




25. Would you say that San Francisco is growing too fast or too slow?
