About The San Francisco Survey

- The San Francisco Survey is a project of the Committee on Jobs, conducted by EMC Research. Our goals are to develop an on-going tool to gauge public opinion and to help inform elected officials and interested parties of the public's views on policy issues. The San Francisco Survey uses an open and transparent platform and will release the results of each of the surveys it conducts.
- In addition to providing survey results, the San Francisco Survey will release demographic and voter data on a regular basis to help inform policy discussions in San Francisco.



Methodology

- Web Survey of San Francisco Voters
- Offered in English, Chinese, and Spanish
- Demographics closely match the demographics of the registered voters in the city

*Surveys only offered in English and Chinese.


Key Findings

- San Francisco voters continue to be "cranky" despite, or maybe because of, the booming economy.
- It appears that the continual decline in optimism may have ended, with little change or slight improvements compared with early September.
- Economic confidence is down significantly compared with 2014.
- Housing, homelessness, and cost of living continue to be top concerns.



Right Direction/Wrong Track

Over a majority of voters are still pessimistic about the direction of the City.




Q3. Do you think things in San Francisco are generally going in the right direction, or do you feel that things are pretty seriously off on the wrong track?

I am unhappy or worried about changes happening in San Francisco




Do you agree or disagree with each of the following statements?

Over a quarter of SF voters are excited about the future of the City – up 8 points since September.






San Francisco Attitudes

A solid majority of SF voters agree that San Francisco is a good place to live.



Do you agree or disagree with each of the following statements?


22. I am likely to move out of San Francisco in the next few years




SF as a Place to Raise a Family

Cost of living, housing, and homelessness are selected by over half as one of SF's top 3 problems.



Housing and cost of living continue to be the most important problems in San Francisco, while concerns about homelessness have decreased slightly since Sept.







Cost of living and housing are still the top problems in San Francisco neighborhoods, and mentions of crime have lowered slightly since September.





Priorities


Addressing homelessness and supporting local schools are the top priorities for SF voters.

Homelessness continues to rise a priority for SF voters. Improving public transportation has grown as a priority since September.




Q31-39. On a scale from 1 to 7, where 1 is not at all important and 7 is extremely important, how important do you feel each of the following should be in San Francisco right now?
