About The San Francisco Survey

- The San Francisco Survey is a project of the Committee on Jobs, conducted by EMC Research. Our goals are to develop an on-going tool to gauge public opinion and to help inform elected officials and interested parties of the public's views on policy issues. The San Francisco Survey uses an open and transparent platform and will release the results of each of the surveys it conducts.
- In addition to providing survey results, the San Francisco Survey will release demographic and voter data on a regular basis to help inform policy discussions in San Francisco.



Methodology

- Web Survey of San Francisco Voters
- Offered in English, Chinese, and Spanish
- Demographics closely match the demographics of the registered voters in the city

*Surveys only offered in English and Chinese.


Key Findings

- Although pessimism among SF voters appeared to have leveled off last October, moodiness has persisted into 2016 – 58% say things in SF are off on the wrong track.
- Homelessness has become a top concern along with housing and cost of living.
- There is widespread support for building more housing in SF, particularly for middle class families, and a strong majority support raising building height limits along transit corridors.
- The term "affordable housing" is very confusing to people and perceptions about it do not match the policy debate today.


Right Direction/Wrong Track



Q3. Do you think things in San Francisco are generally going in the right direction, or do you feel that things are pretty seriously off on the wrong track?





Do you agree or disagree with each of the following statements? **Q14.** I am unhappy or worried about changes happening in San Francisco




Excited about Future/Worried about Changes




I am likely to move out of San Francisco in the next few years








Most Important Problem in Your Neighborhood

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

"Affordable Housing" Means...

"'Affordable Housing' means that working class persons can afford to live in SF"

"Monthly rent or mortgage should not exceed more than 1/3 of the monthly income of the median San Franciscan"

"A price point that teachers, small business owners and nurses can afford"

"Below market rate housing for those that have lower incomes"

"Safe and comfortable place to live for individuals and/or families who make a low wage"

"An individual/couple/family can pay for their rent but still have money for other basic necessities"


"A person could get by on a full-time, minimum wage job and afford to have a roof over their head"

"Builder supported/funded lower cost residential units made available to lower income families/persons"

"If you make at least minimum wage, you can afford to live in the City" "Government subsidized housing"




Housing Proposals – Building More Housing



Build more housing for low-income families and individuals


Build more housing for all income levels

Housing Proposals – Height Limits




Raise building height limits along commercial and transit corridors in order to add additional affordable housing units

Restrict new development to existing general plan and zoning limits




