Methodology



- Web Survey of San Francisco Voters
- Offered in English, Chinese, and Spanish
- Demographics closely match the demographics of the registered voters in the city

Key Findings



- About half of voters are pessimistic about the direction of San Francisco. A similar number are unhappy or worried about changes in the city.
- Homelessness, cost of living, and housing remain as the most prominent top of mind issues for San Francisco voters.
- London Breed, Mark Leno, and Jane Kim are the early front runners in the June 2018 mayoral race.




General Attitudes About SF

Right Direction/Wrong Track




About half of San Francisco voters think the city is off on the wrong track.

Nearly half of voters are unhappy or worried about changes in San Francisco while a quarter are excited.




Do you agree or disagree with each of the following statements? Q18. I am unhappy or worried about changes happening in SF Q19. I am excited about the future of SF

One quarter of voters continue to indicate that they may move out of San Francisco next few years.


I am likely to move out of San Francisco in the next few years



Top Three Problems In San Francisco




The percentage of those concerned about homelessness continues to rise.

Homelessness is the top problem cited in San Francisco, followed by cost of living.





General Priorities




Addressing homelessness and controlling the cost of living are top priorities for SF voters.



General Priorities – Trend Over Time




Addressing homelessness continues to be the top priority among SF voters.

Building more housing has risen recently on the list of voter priorities.






2018 Mayoral Race

Different titles for London Breed have no significant impact on how voters rate her.



First Choice Votes (All Registered Voters)




Breed, Kim, and Leno also receive the most votes among all registered voters, but the percentage who say they don't know who they'll vote for is higher.



First Choice Votes – High Turnout June '18 Electorate (48% ARV)



Among a high turnout likely June electorate, Breed and Leno receive the most votes, followed by Kim.
