About the San Francisco Survey

- The San Francisco Survey is a project of the Committee on Jobs, conducted by EMC Research. Our goals are to develop an on-going tool to gauge public opinion and to help inform elected officials and interested parties of the public's views on policy issues. The San Francisco Survey uses an open and transparent platform and will release the results of each of the surveys it conducts.
- In addition to providing survey results, the San Francisco Survey will release demographic and voter data on a regular basis to help inform policy discussions in San Francisco.

Methodology



- Web Survey of San Francisco Voters offered in English, Chinese, and Spanish
- Demographics closely match the demographics of the registered voters in the city

Key Findings



- San Francisco voters are growing increasingly more pessimistic.
- Economic confidence continues to decline, and voters feel that economic growth is not benefiting all San Franciscans.
- Voters are still very concerned about homelessness, cost of living, and housing.



Right Direction — Wrong Track





Q3. Do you think things in San Francisco are generally going in the right direction, or do you feel that things are pretty seriously off on the wrong track?

Right Direction/Wrong Track by Length of Time in SF







Right Direction/Wrong Track by Homeownership and Age in SF



Perception of Current Economic Conditions






Q4. Would you rate current economic conditions in San Francisco as substantially better, moderately better, the same, moderately worse, or substantially worse than six months ago?




Top Three Problems In San Francisco

Single Most Important Problem (Top Ranked)









General Priorities – Trend Over Time








Q20-28. On a scale from 1 to 7 where 1 is not at all important and 7 is extremely important, how important do you feel each of the following should be in San Francisco right now?




Q18-26. On a scale from 1 to 7 where 1 is not at all important and 7 is extremely important, how important do you feel each of the following should be in San Francisco right now?











November 2019 Ballot Measures


November 2019 Ballot Measures Text



- **Proposition A: Affordable Housing Bond**. SAN FRANCISCO AFFORDABLE HOUSING BONDS. To finance the construction, development, acquisition, and preservation of housing affordable to extremely-low, low and middle-income households through programs that will prioritize vulnerable populations such as San Francisco's working families, veterans, seniors, and persons with disabilities; to assist in the acquisition, rehabilitation, and preservation of extremely affordable housing to prevent the displacement of residents; to repair and reconstruct distressed and dilapidated public housing developments and their underlying infrastructure; to assist the City's middle-income residents or workers in obtaining affordable rental or home ownership opportunities including down payment assistance and support for new construction of affordable housing for San Francisco Unified School District and City College of San Francisco employees; and to pay related costs; shall the City and County of San Francisco issue \$600,000,000 in general obligation bonds with a duration of up to 30 years from the time of issuance, an estimated average tax rate of \$0.019/\$100 of assessed property value, and projected average annual revenues of \$50,000,000, subject to independent citizen oversight and regular audits?
- **Proposition C: Vapor Products**. Shall the City overturn the law passed by the Board of Supervisors suspending the sale of electronic cigarettes that lack required FDA authorization, and adopt new regulations on the sale, manufacture, distribution and advertising of electronic cigarettes in San Francisco?
- **Proposition D: Traffic Congestion Mitigation Tax**. Shall the City impose a 1.5% business tax on shared rides and a 3.25% business tax on private rides for fares charged by commercial ride-share and driverless vehicle companies until November 5, 2045, raising an estimated \$30-\$35 million annually, to fund improvements in Muni service and bicycle pedestrian safety?
- **Proposition E: Affordable Housing and Educator Housing**. Shall the City amend the Planning Code to allow 100% Affordable Housing Projects and Educator Housing Projects in public zoning districts and to expedite approval of these projects?
- **Proposition F: Campaign Contributions and Campaign Advertisements**. Shall the City establish new restrictions on campaign contributions to local elected officials and candidates, and apply new disclaimer requirements to campaign advertisements?




Washington High School Mural

Have you seen or heard anything recently about a mural at George Washington High School?





Washington Mural Controversy



Three-quarters of voters feel that the mural should remain up, but students should be educated on the context of the mural.

As you may know, there is a debate as to what to do with a mural at Washington High School. The painting, done by the renowned artist Victor Arnautoff, portrays the life of President George Washington. Included in the mural is the depiction of African American slaves and a dead Native American. After concerns were expressed by some students and advocates, the School Board has considered removing the painting altogether or covering it up.
